Adam Clarke Biblical Commentary: 'An allusion, some think, to those towers which were built at the entrance of harbors, on which fires were kept during the night to direct ships into the port. Genuine Christians, by their holy lives and conversation, are the means of directing others, not only how to escape those dangers to which they are exposed on the tempestuous ocean of human life, but also of leading them into the haven of eternal safety and rest."

Matthew Poole Biblical Commentary: 'carefully bearing before you, and steadfastly showing, not only by your profession, but conversation, the Lord Jesus Christ"

3. The Life
Philippians 2:17-18 NLT "But I will rejoice even if I lose my life, pouring it out like a liquid offering to God, just like your faithful service is an offering to God. And I want all of you to share that joy. Yes, you should rejoice, and I will share your joy."
A "liquid offering" (also called a "drink offering") is a reference to an Old Testament tradition of pouring on the altar of the Lord before the sacrifice was made.
The wine used for the drink offering was composed of " wine."
Strong wine =
Andrew Langham Biblical Commentary: "Wine is [also] a symbol of both to God and to man."
Paul lived a full, undiluted, uncompromising, life that was full of joy from fulfilling God's He is encouraging us to do the same.
